

Each year, the average household uses the energy from 256 pounds of coal to power a television set.<sup>1</sup>

Coal is mined in 25 states and is responsible for over 800,000 jobs.<sup>3</sup>



The longest coal train in North America occurred on November 15, 1967. The train had 500 coal cars and measured 4.06 miles in length.<sup>4</sup>



# COAL-GEN

A typical 500MW coal power plant produces 3.5 Billion kWh per year. That's enough energy for 4 million light bulbs to operate year-round.<sup>5</sup>



From 1970 to 2012, emissions of major pollutants from coal-fueled power plants have been reduced by nearly 90%.<sup>6</sup>



Today, coal will provide more than half the electricity for 3 Billion people on Earth - 10 Times the population of the United States.<sup>7</sup>



Ninety Three Percent of the coal consumed in the United States is used to generate electricity.<sup>8</sup>



The U.S. has about a 235-year supply of coal, if it continues to use it at the same rate as today.<sup>9</sup>
